Redefining Modernism: Explaining the World at War Through Modern Art, 2010

Synopsis

World History is an elusive topic for many students. The goal of this unit is to change the perception of World History as a lecture course and at the same time increase the interest in World History as a relevant, worthy subject. Utilizing modern art in the classroom will help change the perception of World History as a boring, lecture course into a class that has multiple facets that offer students a chance to see different views of the world around them.
